







ABBOTSFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT - VIOLENT CRIME RATE DATA














ABBOTSFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT - SEXUAL ASSAULT DATA







ABBOTSFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT - ASSAULT LEVEL 2/3 DATA









ABBOTSFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT - PROPERTY CRIME RATE


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Repeat Violent Offending Intervention Initiative (REVOII)

- > PROVINCIAL PROGRAM AIMED AT ADDRESSING REPEAT VIOLENT OFFENDING
- > BC CORRECTIONS, POLICE, PROBATION AND DEDICATED PROSECUTORS PROVIDE EARLY INTERVENTIONS FOR IDENTIFIED REPEAT VIOLENT OFFENDERS.
- > 12 REVOII OFFENDERS ACCEPTED INTO PROGRAM FROM ABBOTSFORD
- > PROVIDES PRIORITIZED ACCESS TO MENTAL HEALTH SUPPORTS, ADDICTION SUPPORTS, AND STABILIZED HOUSING ONCE RELEASED FROM CUSTODY
- > STILL EARLY STAGES OF PROGRAM. DATA IS TRENDING IN A POSITIVE DIRECTION

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External Funding

- > CIVIL FORFEITURE OFFICE
- > PROVINCIAL TACTICAL ENFORCEMENT PRIORITY (PTEP)
- > SPECIAL INVESTIGATION AND TARGETED ENFORCEMENT (SITE) PROGRAM
 - > 3 YEAR PILOT PROJECT BY THE PROVINCE- PILOT ENDS IN APRIL 2026
- > COMMUNITY SAFETY TARGETED ENFORCEMENT PROGRAM (C-STEP)
 - > NEW PROVINCIAL FUNDING PROGRAM STARTING MAY 2025
 - > TARGETS NON-VIOLENT REPEAT OFFENDING- FUNDING FOCUS ON PUBLIC SAFETY CONCERNS IN PUBLIC AREAS, ADDICTION AND MENTAL HEALTH CRISIS
- > INTERNET CHILD EXPLOITATION (ICE) TRAINING GRANT
- > BUILDING SAFER COMMUNITIES FUND (BSCF)

Project Spotlight 2023

- > Ensure public safety in and around identified corridors, parks, and commercial properties where violence had been occurring.
 - > AbbyPD received \$411, 000 from SITE program
 - > 87 callout shifts completed
 - > 146 individuals charged with criminal offences
 - > 81 offenders arrested on warrants
 - > 361 Police files generated
 - > 5 repeat violent offenders prioritized and all arrested

Project déjà vu 2024

- High visibility patrols and officer presence in and around hotspots identified using criminal intelligence and analysis.
 - > AbbyPD received \$268,775 from SITE program
 - > 63 callout shifts completed
 - > 162 individuals charged with criminal offences
 - > 93 offenders arrested on outstanding warrants
 - > 380 Police files generated
 - > Business corridors targeted to combat theft offences
 - > Coordinated proactive enforcement of homeless camps throughout city conducted
 - > 1 individual repeat violent offender prioritized and arrested

Project Salus 2025

- > High visibility patrols and officer presence in and around hotspots identified using criminal intelligence and analysis.
- > 2025 SITE funding \$560,000
 - > Phase 1
 - > Target problem and violent youth. Assigned officers will be provided targets and target areas with the goal to disrupt violent youth in the community;
 - > Continuing the success observed from liaising with local businesses and targeting chronic shoplifters in identified business corridors;
 - > Continuing the successes observed from "project 4 corners" utilizing the trespass act to reduce public disorder and violence in the historic downtown Abbotsford corridor.
- > \$20,000 ear marked for implementation of "Datahub" to provide real time automated data and intelligence for AbbyPD;
- > \$15,000 ear marked for the purchase of 3 drones to be utilized by AbbyPD front line officers.

PTEP

- > 7 Police files submitted for cost recovery in 2024
 - > \$210,205 recovered for 2024
- > 2 files YTD for 2025 submitted for cost recovery
 - > \$129,519 recovered YTD for 2025
- > Results
 - > 16+ individuals charged
 - > 100 criminal charges
 - > \$257,682 cash seized
 - > 3 firearms, a large quantity of ammunition and body armour seized
 - > Drugs seized
 - > 7 KG Fentanyl
 - > 2.6 KG Cocaine
 - > 2.1 KG Methamphetamine

Civil Forfeiture Office (CFO)

> For 2024 AbbyPD successfully submitted \$40,258,418 in assets to the Civil Forfeiture office.

PATHWAYS Program:

The AbbyPD Gang Intervention Team (GIT), PATHWAYS is designed to prevent at-risk youth and young adults from gang involvement.

3-pillar approach:

- > Community engagement- Creating relationships with key community organizations with a goal of knowledge sharing.
- > <u>Prevention</u>- Educating families to recognize the risk factors and understand the links between different forms of violence so they can respond before it's too late.
- > <u>Intervention</u>- Work done with youths and young adults and their families, to divert the youths before they become involved with, or are recruited by gangs.

Intervention Data:

- > 90 at-risk youth and young adults referred to the Pathways program over 5 years.
- > Referrals received from parents, school, community organizations and internally from AbbyPD members.

Initially funded through the Provincial Guns and Gangs Violence Action Fund (GGVAF), PATHWAYS is now funded by the Federal Building Safer Communities Fund (BCSF) until March 2026.
